Broadway revivals demonstrate the show's durability with new productions having appeared in 1955, 1965, 1976, 1992, and 2009 GUYS AND DOLLS won the 1951 Tony Award for Best Musical. The film adaptation, starring Frank Sinatra and Marlon Brando, was produced in 1955.

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
The Surveying Boundaries Pop-up Art Gallery will be located at 19560 Grand River from February 1st through the 28th.

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

Proposed Master Plan for Park Grounds



Community House with Proposed Addition

Proposed Master Plan for Community House and Grounds Unveiled at Annual Meeting



"This is inspiring!" Those are the words a North Rosedale Park resident used to describe the proposed master plan for the Community House and grounds presented by architect Guss Pappas at the NRPCA's annual meeting in January.

About 75 residents saw the proposed plan complete with site plans and conceptual drawings proposed by Pappas. In November, the NRPCA board hired Pappas' firm, Constantine George Pappas Architecture, to develop a master plan and provide design services for Phase One of the Capital Campaign. The master plan calls for construction of a 3,000-squarefoot addition on the south side of the Community House to include a new lobby, handicap-accessible restrooms, office, enclosed staircases and elevator. The Community House is presently 9000 square feet.

Other features of the plan for the Community House include:

- Moving the main entrance to the east side, off of the parking lot.
- Converting the existing lobby, restrooms and office to meeting and multi-purpose rooms.
- Expanding the building on the east side to provide access to the new meeting rooms.
- Constructing a patio off the new lobby.
- Adding a concession stand and restroom by the kitchen next to the playground.

For the grounds, the plan involves:

 Adding walking/jogging paths and concrete walks on the north and east perimeters of the park.

- Adding a natural outdoor performance space with lawn and chair seating.
- Adding parking spaces along the driveway for parking for the playground.
- Replacing the garage and providing additional storage for various groups and activities.
- Expanding the exit driveway to allow two-way traffic.
- Constructing a car turnaround area at the end of the parking lot near Bretton.
- Repositioning one of the soccer fields to accommodate the patio.

Surveys completed by those at the meeting indicated strong support for the proposed improvements. Respondents felt that the improvements would serve the needs of the community. Most said they would consider making a financial contribution to the project or already had. One participant said, "We need to find a very concise way to describe and illustrate the plan...to help sell it to everyone."

Pappas is expecting to solicit additional feedback from North Rosedale

residents. The proposed master plan will go to the NRPCA board for review and approval in March. Pappas will provide NRPCA with estimated construction and renovation costs as the board considers the plan.


While the proposed master plan is expected to take 2 or 3 phases to complete, Capital Campaign leaders are looking to complete the addition to the Community House during Phase One. Construction could begin as soon as this fall.

Meanwhile, fundraising for the Capital Campaign continues, with \$525,000 raised thus far. The Capital Campaign now shifts to a general outreach as North Rosedale Park residents are contacted and encouraged to contribute to the campaign.

What is the Capital Campaign?

For nearly 75 years, the North Rosedale Community House and the seven-acre park surrounding it have been the focal point of our community. As with any building, time has taken its toll on the Community House. In order to address many of structural problems and the need to update the facility, the Capital Campaign was created. Funds raised during phase one of the campaign will correct structural problems -- sinking floors, electrical and plumbing issues, and handicap accessibility -- and enhance activities by creating a new lobby, expanding the parking lot, installing additional lighting, and renovating the patio.

City of Detroit Bulk Pickup is Friday. February 7, 2014

The City will collect up to one cubic yard of bulk from the curb in front of your home four times a year.

One cubic yard of bulk is about the size of a couch, stove or refrigerator. Your one cubic yard of bulk cannot weigh more than 1,000 pounds. Bulk items totaling more than one cubic yard or weighing more than 1,000 pounds will not be collected, and the homeowner and tenant will be subject to a fine of up to \$10,000.

Community Organizer Dies, Touches Many Lives


