#### Love your pets, respect your neighbors

If you like walkable communities, you couldn't have picked a better place to live than Historic Rosedale Park. Our beautiful tree-lined streets, local parks, and playgrounds make for great walking alone, with family and friends, and with beloved furry friends. During this crisis, neighbors have complained about dogs running loose. The following are a few reminders about dog ownership in Detroit:

- All dogs must be current on their rabies vaccination.
- All dogs must be licensed.
- Dogs are not allowed to run loose and **must be on a** leash when in public.
- Owners must clean-up after their dog and properly dispose of waste.
- Dogs are not allowed to be chained/tethered 24 hours a day.
- Outside dogs must have appropriate shelter.

The latest press release from the City of Detroit shows the Rosedale Park neighborhood with a .1% lead over North Rosedale in the District 1 2020 Census Standings, with a response rate of 70.8% in filling out their census forms. North Rosedale held a solid second-place with 70.7%. Rounding out the top five: Greenfield-Grand River (66.8%). ## What Activities Are Rosedale Park Families Doing During This Crisis?

As Rosedale residents abide by Governor Whitmer's "Stay Home, Stay Safe" order, families organize a new normal structure to their daily lives. Here are a few:

Dwight and Carla Blakey (Ashton): While the parents are working mostly from home, the kids are doing schoolwork. "It's all business during the day," said Dwight Blakey. Five of the Blakey children are home studying in virtual classrooms: Victoria is a junior at Bowling Green State University, Hanna is

a sophomore at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, Qeren and Auriel are at Mercy High School, and Joie is at Bates Academy. Exercise is an important part of each day for everyone, which includes bike rides through Rosedale Park. Like other families, the Blakeys work on puzzles and watch movies together.
